This is in response to the above noted matter.

At its meeting on April 10, 2017, City Council adopted the following recommendation of the Development Services Committee:

- “1. That pursuant to Report DS-17-68 dated March 23, 2017, Council endorse in principle the concept of establishing Oshawa as a Centre of Urban Innovation that would promote business, academia, government and non-government organizations to work together to research, develop and test new technologies and methods for addressing urban issues and opportunities; and,
2. 3. That pursuant to Report DS-17-68 dated March 23, 2017, the City Manager be authorized to sign any required agreement for individual initiatives related to the Centre of Urban Innovation concept in a form and content acceptable to the City Manager and City Solicitor and subject to any required City funding being available for such initiatives to the satisfaction of the Executive Director of Finance Services/Treasurer; and,
4. That a copy of Report DS-17-68 dated March 23, 2017 and related Council resolution be provided to the Premier of Ontario, the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development, Ministry of Citizenship and Immigration, Ministry of Economic Development and Growth, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Municipal Affairs, Ministry of Research, Innovation and Science, Durham Region Members of Parliament, Durham Region Members of Provincial Parliament and Region of Durham.”

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## **1.0 Purpose**

By letter dated March 17, 2017 the University of Ontario Institute of Technology (UOIT), Durham College, the University of Toronto (Department of Civil Engineering) and the Canadian Urban Institute have expressed their interest in working with the City to establish Oshawa as a Centre for Urban Innovation with respect to creating and teaching solutions to urban issues.

The purpose of this report is to recommend that the City enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the above noted post-secondary institutions/organization to advance this initiative.

Attachment 1 is the letter dated March 17, 2017.

## **2.0 Recommendation**

That the Development Services Committee recommend to City Council:

1. That, pursuant to Report DS-17-68 dated March 23, 2017, Council endorse, in principle, the concept of establishing Oshawa as a Centre of Urban Innovation that would promote business, academia, government and non-government organizations to work together to research, develop and test new technologies and methods for addressing urban issues and opportunities.
2. That, pursuant to Report DS-17-68 dated March 23, 2017, the Mayor and Clerk be authorized to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding with the University of Ontario Institute of Technology (UOIT), Durham College, the University of Toronto (Department of Civil Engineering) and the Canadian Urban Institute in a form and content to the

satisfaction of the City Manager and City Solicitor, that outlines the objectives, the roles and responsibilities of the parties and any administrative items to guide the Centre of Urban Innovation concept.

3. That, pursuant to Report DS-17-68 dated March 23, 2017, the City Manager be authorized to sign any required agreement for individual initiatives related to the Centre of Urban Innovation concept in a form and content acceptable to the City Manager and City Solicitor and subject to any required City funding being available for such initiatives to the satisfaction of the Executive Director of Finance Services/Treasurer.
4. That a copy of Report DS-17-68 dated March 23, 2017 and related Council resolution be provided to the Premier of Ontario, the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development, Ministry of Citizenship and Immigration, Ministry of Economic Development and Growth, Ministry of Education, Ministry of Municipal Affairs, Ministry of Research, Innovation and Science, Durham Region Members of Parliament, Durham Region Members of Provincial Parliament and Region of Durham.

### **5.0 Analysis**

UOIT, Durham College, the University of Toronto (Department of Civil Engineering) and the Canadian Urban Institute have requested that the City of Oshawa form a collaborative partnership to establish the City as a leading Centre of Urban Innovation focused on creating and teaching solutions to urban issues. The letter making the request is included as Attachment 1.

The vision is for Oshawa to become a primary location where business, academia, government agencies and non-government organizations work together to research, develop and test new technologies and methods for addressing urban issues and opportunities.

City staff believe that the proposed partnership represents an opportunity to:

- Create a living laboratory for addressing and studying a wide range of complex issues facing Oshawa and other cities
- Leverage City resources by engaging academic and private sector expertise



- Become a leader with respect to continually improving municipal services and quality of life in the community
- Differentiate the City from other jurisdictions as a place to demonstrate and invest in the development of new technologies and techniques
- Create job and business investment opportunities

Based upon City staff's discussion with UOIT it is expected to begin the process by undertaking a few initial pilot initiatives. The number and type of participants will vary depending on the nature of any individual initiative. The participants for each initiative would collaborate on the development of terms of reference that would describe the objectives, the scope of work to be performed, the roles and responsibilities of each participant, the approved budget and any specific issues related to the individual initiative such as the rights to intellectual property arising from any collaborative research.

If required, a separate agreement will be executed for each individual initiative as appropriate. The City's contribution to launch the individual initiatives is anticipated to be the use of internal City resources supplemented by support from students. If possible, the partners will jointly seek sources of external funding to support the individual initiatives.

An annual status report will be presented to Council.

It is recommended that a high level Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) be established between the initial parties. It should be recognized that additional participants such as Trent University Durham may also join in this concept at a later date or collaborate on specific initiatives. The objective of the MOU would be to define the Centre for Urban Innovations concept, its operations and governance.

The MOU with the UOIT on Diversity and Inclusion is a current example how the City of Oshawa and a post-secondary institution work collaboratively together on certain projects.

## **6.0 Financial Implications**

It is anticipated that a few pilot initiatives would be advanced in 2017. The City's initial commitment will involve using paid co-op students, supplemented by the assistance of cap-stone students (at no cost). The use of co-op students in 2017 can be accommodated using funds within the approved 2017 budget.

Specific initiatives will have defined terms of reference and budgets as appropriate. Any associated financial implications related to the initiatives will be reported for Council approval.

## 7.0 Relationship to the Oshawa Strategic Plan

The recommendation advances the Accountable Leadership and Economic Prosperity and Financial Stewardship Goals of the Oshawa Strategic Plan.

Subject: Establishing the City of Oshawa as a centre for urban innovation by developing and teaching solutions to urban issues

Over the last number of years, the City of Oshawa has embraced the need for continuous improvement and innovation as a way of meeting its challenges and the needs of the community. UOIT, Durham College and City staff have discussed opportunities on how Oshawa could build momentum and establish the City as a leading centre of urban innovation focused on experiential learning, applied research and innovative teaching partnerships to address urban issues. The purpose of this letter is to request that Oshawa City Council endorse the concept and authorize City officials to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with interested partners. The MOU will guide the development and implementation of this initiative.

### **The Need**

Today, almost every doctor, particularly specialists, train as a resident in an academic hospital. Most of today's cutting edge medical procedures and treatments originated in a medical research facility. The world spends 3 to 4 times more on urban services such as transportation, buildings, energy, water and waste than it does on healthcare, but there is not yet a 'teaching and research city'. Continued urbanization across the globe demands the development of new technologies, policies and practices along with the experienced professional talent to guide and manage complex urban issues.

The City of Oshawa, along with its local and regional partners, can develop the City as a 'living laboratory' to address and study these complex urban issues and identify opportunities. Following is a brief note to initiate Oshawa's move toward becoming a recognized leader in the development of urban solutions - thus a centre for urban innovation.

## **The Centre for Urban Innovation Concept**

The vision is for Oshawa to become a primary location where business, academia, government agencies and NGO's gather to develop and test new technologies and methods for addressing urban issues and opportunities – on the ground and in real time.

Oshawa is uniquely positioned to take on this role. The City is part of one of the largest urban areas in North America and needs to deal with 'big city' issues. As a mid-sized municipality, the City can be nimble and serve as a practical testing ground. The City has both mature and growing areas providing a range of possible initiatives. Most importantly, the City has strong local partners with complementary interests.

We propose a partnership that will foster a collaborative relationship focused on problem solving, applied research, experiential learning, innovative education, market-driven training, and evidence-based policy development. Together the partners would explore and pursue the following objectives:

- Draft an MOU outlining objectives, roles and responsibilities of the parties and general terms and conditions;
- Identify and develop initiatives focused on creating practical, scalable and sustainable solutions to urban issues;
- Develop, disseminate and potentially commercialize technologies and techniques
- Develop and coordinate joint experiential learning opportunities, applied research, and innovative educational activities;
- Contribute to seminars, workshops and academic initiatives that drive the business goals of the City;
- Share access to facilities, equipment, systems, information and data;
- Work toward the long-term positioning of Oshawa as a locally and globally recognized community of urban research and learning.

## **Developing the Partnership**

City of Oshawa staff have expressed its desire to emerge as a “teaching municipality”. In addition, there is interest in developing partnerships with academic institutions in the Greater Toronto Area for the purpose of experiential learning, applied research, innovation, education, market-driven training and evidence-based policy development.

UOIT, Durham College, the University of Toronto - Department of Civil Engineering, and the Canadian Urban Institute seek to formally collaborate with the City of Oshawa to further innovate, research and enhance academic programming. We will continue to engage additional partners who can help drive this initiative.

Partners, including private sector groups, will be engaged on a project basis as part of this initiative. Private sector participation in the design and implementation of initiatives and related experiential learning, applied research and market-driven programs will provide a market-focused dimension that creates opportunities for establishing new business ventures in the

community. In addition to the staff expertise and assets the private sector may be able to contribute, they can assist with turning ideas into products through to commercialization.

### **Getting Started**

We believe that the place to start would be to undertake **a few pilot initiatives** while we continue discussions between City staff, researchers, the private sector and other partners with respect to refining the centre for urban innovations concept, its operations and governance.

The participants would identify pilot initiatives and collaborate on the development of project charters, e.g. terms of reference, project objectives, scope of work, budget, intellectual property rights, etc. Pilot initiatives would be subject to the availability of funds, personnel and other resources, and required approvals. The participants will seek support and funding from both internal and external sources as appropriate to ensure the success of projects.

Prior to initiating specific activities, it would be beneficial to establish a MOU between the initial parties, recognizing that additional participants may join in later or collaborate on specific initiatives. The MOU would outline the initiative's objectives and the roles and responsibilities of the parties, as well as other items that will assist with its success.

### **Conclusion**

We believe this initiative will position The City of Oshawa and the participants as recognized leaders on urban issues and solutions.

We urge the Committee to recommend that City Council endorse the concept and authorize City officials to work with interested partners and develop a MOU to guide the development and implementation of Oshawa as the centre for urban innovation.



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**Executive Summary:** In 2016, staff reported on activities underway respecting the retirement of the Pickering Nuclear Generation Station (PNGS) and recommended that staff continue to report to Council at strategic milestones leading up to the shutdown of the PNGS. The purpose of this report is to follow up on the initial report and provide an update on activities related to the relicence renewal of the PNGS and the preparations for the shutdown of the Pickering station.

There are five updates at this time. Firstly, in April 2017, a hearing will be held to consider the renewal of the Pickering Waste Management Facility's licence to 2028, and to hear Ontario Power Generation's (OPG) application to construct additional processing and storage buildings to accommodate the used fuel that will be generated by the shutdown of the Pickering station.

Secondly, in August 2017, OPG will submit a request to the Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission (CNSC) for renewal of PNGS's current five year operating licence, which expires on August 31, 2018. In accordance with the conditions of the current licence, the licence renewal request will contain dates for the shutdown of the Pickering station and information regarding extended operations and decommissioning.

Thirdly, the CNSC initiated a community outreach and engagement program earlier this year. The program will continue into 2018.

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## **2.1 Additional facilities will be constructed in the Pickering Waste Management Facility**

Used nuclear fuel from the Pickering reactors is placed in wet storage pools (located inside the Generating Station) to cool for a period of at least ten years. Subsequently, the used fuel is processed and stored on site in Dry Storage Containers (DSC) within the PWMF. Currently, the PWMF consists of one DSC processing building, three DSC storage buildings, and the Retube Component Storage Area. This Retube area stores the intermediate-level radioactive waste, excluding the used nuclear fuel, resulting from the refurbishment of Pickering reactor units 1 to 4.

OPG is seeking approval from the CNSC to construct additional facilities at the Pickering waste facility, including a second DSC processing building and three more DSC storage buildings. This will result in an increase in the capacity for the processing and storage of used fuel. These additional facilities will allow the processing and storage of all the used fuel generated by the shutdown and decommissioning of the Pickering station. OPG's application to construct additional buildings will also be considered at the upcoming public hearing into the relicence renewal of the PWMF scheduled for April 11 and 12, 2017.

## **3.0 The Pickering Nuclear Generating Station's current licence expires in 2018**

In 2010, the Province of Ontario announced that the shutdown of the PNGS be planned for 2020. In January 2016, after technical work and investigations into safely extending the life of the station, the Province announced that the operation of the station will be extended to 2024. The extension was to ensure the generation of electricity during the refurbishment of the Darlington and Bruce nuclear plants.

In May 2016, OPG informed the CNSC of its intent to request a 10 year Power Reactor Operating Licence for the period between September 1, 2018 and August 31, 2028. PNGS's current five year operating licence expires on August 31, 2018. OPG's submission to the CNSC for licence renewal will be made a year in advance, in August 2017.

CNSC has yet to announce the hearing dates. As required by conditions attached to the current licence, the licence renewal request will contain permanent shutdown dates, and extended operations and decommissioning plans. OPG plans to operate until 2024. The licence term between 2024 and 2028 will allow for safe storage activities.

Subject: Pickering Nuclear Generating Station  
 Status of Activities

In the spring of 2016, the Repurposing Pickering Preliminary Assessment Report was issued. Additionally, OPG released a report resulting from their Youth Engagement Workshops on repurposing the Pickering site. The Assessment Report provided a short list of preferred options for further investigation. The options included uses in the power, industrial, institutional, and recreational categories. Results from the Youth Workshops were similar to the findings of the Assessment Report.

The Assessment Report indicated that the next step is for OPG to assess the commercial viability and ease of implementation of the repurposing options, and to continue to work with the City of Pickering and the Region of Durham to ensure alignment with their visions for the site, remaining mindful of provincial energy policy.

For the past number of years municipalities have had challenges getting Motor Vehicle Collision Reports (MVCR) so that they could recover damages to municipal infrastructure. Often, when municipalities received MVCRS, these documents were heavily redacted to the point where the municipality could not identify the person(s) involved. This has been a long standing issue on OGRA's policy agenda.

Ministry of Transportation of Ontario has been working to find a solution to this problem. Municipalities can now receive MVCRS to assist in claiming damages and they can also receive collision data that can be used for statistical analysis. MTO has enlisted OGRA's assistance in disseminating the information to Ontario municipalities.

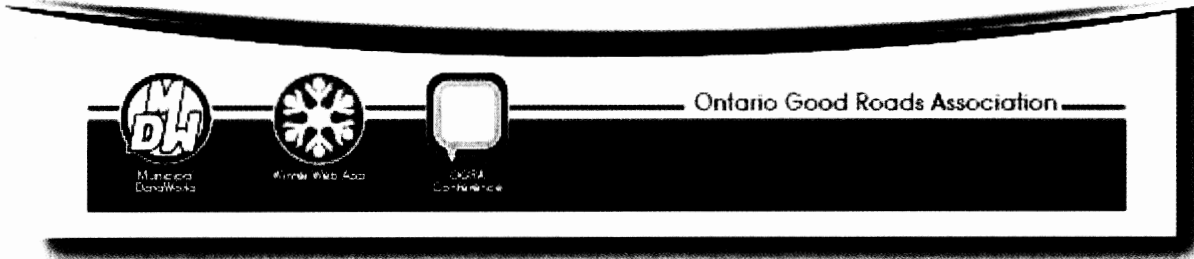

Dear Mr. Lovekin:

Thank you for your letter of March 16, 2017. We, the Friends of Ajax-Pickering Hospital, are pleased to hear that the Board of Lakeridge Health is committed to fulfilling and is diligently addressing all the items in the Minister's Order. We have been waiting patiently since the official merger on December 1, 2016 for some concrete actions on those items and are unaware of any underway.

In your letter you acknowledge the Minister's support of "Lakeridge's robust governance model". May we remind you that support was made after a letter, dated January 26, 2016, was sent to the Minister from your predecessor. In that letter your Board proposed an expedited integration, transferring Ajax-Pickering Hospital, with all of its assets, into the Lakeridge Health Corporation, instead of creating the new corporate entity recommended by the Expert Panel that was also the preference of Ajax-Pickering Hospital.

In return your Board promised:

- That a clinical VP would be assigned to the Ajax-Pickering site;
- That an Associate Chief of Staff would continue at the Ajax-Pickering site;
- To commit to open up a fair and proportionate number of seats for Ajax-Pickering.

The Minister has given you the expedited integration you asked for but we are still waiting for you to reciprocate with your commitments.

Regarding the three currently appointed Board members residing within Ajax-

Pickering, we congratulate them on your high opinion of their industry and dedication but we raised neither attribute and did not then nor consider now these attributes relevant to our concerns. Allow us to reiterate those concerns clearly to avoid further confusion. All three of these Board Members had also been Board Members of Rouge Valley Health System where all three voted to keep Ajax-Pickering within the Rouge Valley Health System despite the community's wishes, despite the Expert Panel's recommendation and despite the Minister's directive. Their place of residence or occupation, or for that matter, level of industry and dedication do not outweigh their demonstrated track record of representing neither the interests of Ajax-Pickering Hospital nor the community it serves. No doubt skills matrices can contribute to the process of adding appropriate board members but community support must place community representation first. We trust this makes our position and concerns much clearer.

Failure to reciprocate on each of the commitments outlined above, in particular the legitimate concerns of the residents of West Durham about fair and proportionate Board representation with candidates clearly supporting our community's interests, risks losing the support of the community that the Minister is relying upon for the success of this merger. We also want to make the merger work but we need a partner who we can trust and trust comes from concrete actions and not merely words. In the four months since the merger, transition is underway, changes are being made to the Board composition and to the corporate and medical by-laws and planning is about to start for health care services delivery for all of Durham. Yet we still have no representation appropriate for West Durham. It is imperative that the Minister's directive be implemented by immediately expanding the Board by two seats from individuals in West Durham supported by the Councils of the Town of Ajax and the City of Pickering.
