Bill 229, Protect, Support and Recover from COVID-19 Act (Budget Measures) – Changes to the Conservation Authorities Act and Planning Act, File: L14-45

Report:

1. Purpose

1.1 On December 8, 2020, Bill 229, Support and Recover from COVID-19 Act (Budget Measures) received Royal Assent. The purpose of this report is to provide an update on the final version of <u>Bill 229</u>, in particular Schedule 6 related to the Conservation Authorities Act and Planning Act.

2. Previous Reports and Decisions

- 2.1 The following Regional staff reports related to conservation authority matters have been provided to Council over the last three years:
 - Bill 139, Building Better Communities and Conserving Watersheds Act, 2017, and associated supportive documents, Report #2017-INFO-79.
 - Proposed amendments to the Conservation Authorities Act and associated regulations, Report #2019-P-27.
 - Durham's Response to Bill 108, Ontario's Housing Supply Action Plan, 2019 and related Regulatory Proposal Changes, Report #2019-A-22.

- Bill 229, Protect, Support and Recover from COVID-19 Act (Budget Measures) – Changes to the Conservation Authorities Act and Planning Act, Report #2020-P-26.
- In relation to the above report, Regional Council at its meeting on November 25, 2020 passed a resolution requesting that Schedule 6 to Bill 229 be removed.

3. Overview of Changes

- 3.1 Changes were made to Bill 229 during its review by the Standing Committee of Economic and Financial Affairs in early December, prior to the legislation passing third reading and Royal Assent. The following sections provide highlights of the changes made to Schedule 6 Conservation Authorities Act (CA Act) and consequential amendments to the Planning Act.
- 3.2 Section 14 of the CA Act was amended to ensure that at least **70 per cent** of the members of a conservation authority (CA) board that are municipal councillors.
- 3.3 Section 14 was also amended to provide the Minister with authority to exempt CAs from the 70 per cent rule.
- 3.4 While the first version of Schedule 6 of Bill 229 included the ability for the Minister to appoint an additional member to a conservation authority Board from the agricultural sector, the final version of Bill 229 included restrictions of voting power for the agricultural representative. They will not be able to vote on matters related to:
 - enlarging an authority's area of jurisdiction;
 - a decision to amalgamate a CA with another CA;
 - a resolution to dissolve a CA; and
 - budgetary matters.
- 3.5 The final version of Bill 229 removed the proposed clause that directed municipal representatives on CA Boards to act on behalf of their municipalities, and not on behalf of the CA. Concerns had been raised regarding the implications of such a clause, that such a clause would severely limit a Board member's fiduciary responsibility to the authority.
- 3.6 Section 17 of the CA Act has seen further amendments related to the appointment of chairs and vice-chairs and rotating amongst municipalities. The amendment

ensures that a member appointed to the CA Board by a particular participating municipality cannot be appointed to succeed an outgoing chair or vice-chair appointed to the CA Board by the same participating municipality. The Minister now has the ability to grant permission to the CA/municipality to allow a Chair or Vice-Chair to hold office for more than two consecutive terms, and for the rotation to be augmented.

- 3.7 Section 28 (Permits) of the CA Act was further revised to add a provision related to permits issued where there is a Minister's Zoning Order (outside of the Greenbelt Plan Area). The change requires a CA to grant permission to an applicant to carry out a development project if a Minister's Zoning Order has authorized the development. As revised, the CA's permission may be granted subject to conditions specified by the CA, to mitigate effects on control of flooding, erosion, dynamic beaches or pollution or conservation of land, health and safety as a result of the damage or destruction of property. The conditions may be subject to a review by the Minister, or they may be appealed to the Local Planning Appeal Tribunal. Where CA permission is granted, the permit holder must enter into an agreement with the CA, where circumstances warrant, in order to compensate for ecological and other impacts that may result from the development project.
- 3.8 The "Entry Without Warrant" sections of the CA Act were revised to clarify wording related to notices and conditions; however, the changes further restrict when CA officials can enter a property without a warrant to check for compliance. The restriction requires reasonable grounds that the contravention is causing, or is likely to cause, significant damage in addition to the other conditions that were being imposed.
- 3.9 The permissions in the CA Act related to issuance of Stop Work Orders and enforcement tools were re-introduced through Bill 229, including penalties for offences under Section 28 of the Act. These changes still require supporting regulations that have yet to be released.
- 3.10 Additional regulations to be developed under the CA Act were added, including but not limited to:
 - prescribing budgetary matters;
 - respecting the process CAs must follow when preparing a budget and the consultations that are required;

- providing for rules and procedures governing meetings at which budgetary matters are discussed, including the quorum for such meetings and the rules respecting voting on budgetary matters;
- governing transitional matters related to Bill 229 itself, particularly related to permits for development projects enacted by MZOs; and
- governing Minister's reviews and appeals to LPAT of Section 28 permits and specifying circumstances in which a review may not be requested, or an appeal may not be made.
- 3.11 Section 26 of the Planning Act was further amended to allow for CAs to continue to participate in LPAT proceedings when an appeal is related to a prescribed natural hazard risk, or if the CA is an applicant for land division (consent) in a matter under appeal. A transition policy was also introduced that permits CAs to continue as a party to an appeal until the appeal is disposed of.

4. Relationship to Strategic Plan

- 4.1 This report aligns with/addresses the following strategic goals and priorities in the Durham Region Strategic Plan:
 - a. Under the goal of Environmental Sustainability, Priority 1.3: to protect, preserve and restore the natural environment, including greenspaces, waterways, parks, trails, and farmlands;
 - b. Under the goal of Environmental Sustainability, Priority 1.4: demonstrate leadership in sustainability and addressing climate change.
- 4.2 This report also aligns with/addresses the Durham Community Climate Adaptation Plan, which focuses on building resilience to climate change impacts.

5. Conclusion

On December 8, 2020 Schedule 6 to Bill 229 was approved by the province despite a request by Regional Council that it be removed from the Bill. Upon review, a number of the new changes to the Conservation Authorities Act are fair improvements. However, the changes that are of concern are related to those that allow the Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry to assume control over the CA's permit granting function and the ability to appeal permit decisions to the Local Planning Appeals Tribunal. It is too early to know how these changes will impact development in Durham Region. Staff will continue to monitor and report back as may be necessary.

- 5.2 Regional staff will also work with the Region's five conservation authorities to determine changes to current practice as a result of the changes to the CA Act under Bill 229.
- 5.3 A copy of this report will be provided to the Area Municipalities for their information.
- 5.4 This report has been prepared in consultation with Corporate Services Legal Services.

Boards of health are required to "superintend, provide or ensure the provision of the health programs and services required by the [Health Protection and Promotion] Act and the regulations to the persons who reside in the health unit served by the board" (section 4, clause a, HPPA). In addition, medical officers of health are required to "[report] directly to the board of health on issues relating to public health concerns and to public health programs and services under this or any other Act" (sub-section 67.(1), HPPA).

Accordingly, the Health Information Update is a component of the Health Department's 'Accountability Framework', which also may include program and other reports, Health Plans, Quality Enhancement Plans, Durham Health Check-Ups, business plans and budgets; provincial performance indicators and targets, monitoring, compliance audits and assessments; RDPS certification; and accreditation by Accreditation Canada.

Re: Amendment to Clarington's Support of a Ministerial Zoning Order

(MZO) Changing the Zoning of 2423 Rundle Road Bowmanville -

Remove All Remaining Conditions

At a meeting held on December 14-15, 2020, the Council of the Municipality of Clarington passed the following Resolution #C-534-20:

That, in accordance with subsection 10.12.17 of the Procedural By-Law, Resolution #C-418-20, regarding Council's support of the Ministerial Zoning Order to change the zoning of 2423 Rundle Road Bowmanville, previously adopted by Council at the Special Council Meeting of October 26, 2020, be amended to remove the conditions of support by deleting Paragraphs 2, and 4, which read:

That the applicant carrying out the necessary studies and implementing the recommended works from:

- Traffic Study;
- Hydrological/Hydrogeological study;
- Environmental Impact Study;
- Servicing Study; and
- Storm water management plan;

That should the Bowmanville site be redeveloped, the applicant commit that 25% of the units be developed as affordable housing units (for low income families).

That the Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing be advised of:

- (i) the foregoing deletion;
- that the letter dated October 27, 2020 which was forwarded to the Minister regarding Resolution C-418-20 is withdrawn and rescinded: and

Whereas COVID-19 continues to have disastrous affects in long-term care homes, retirement homes and congregate facilities in Whitby, Durham and the rest of Ontario; and,

Whereas according to Durham Region Public Health as of December 14, 2020, 117 out of 118 residents at Sunnycrest Nursing Home had tested positive for COVID-19, 25 had died and 61 staff members who reside in Durham Region had also tested positive; and,

Whereas a media report states that an internal inspection report, completed on November 29, 2020, by the Ministry of Long-Term Care states that there was no designated COVID-19 screener wearing full PPE located at the front entrance of the building, and there was an improper use of PPE, a lack of hand hygiene, a lack of access to PPE, and food and high-risk medications for residents were up to 2 hours late, and further, that a lack of staff led to inadequate care; and,

Whereas on December 3, 2020, Lakeridge Health assumed temporary management of Sunnycrest Nursing Home through a Voluntary Management Contract approved by the Ministry of Long-Term Care; and,

Whereas the Town of Whitby Council and our residents offer our deepest condolences to the residents that have passed and their families, and send our best wishes for a speedy recovery to the residents and staff infected with COVID-19;

Whereas part (e) of that Commission states, "in considering the current government initiatives and reforms in the long-term care homes system, any further areas that should be the subject matter of future action by government to help prevent the future spread of disease in long-term care homes"; and,

Whereas long-term care homes can operate either on a not-for-profit (municipal, charitable, non-profit nursing home) or for-profit basis; and,

Whereas the Canadian Medical Association Journal states, "Long-term care (LTC) homes have been the epicenter of the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic in Canada to date. Previous research shows that for-profit LTC homes deliver inferior care across a variety of outcome and process measures, raising the question of whether for-profit homes have had worse COVID-19 outcomes than non-profit homes"; and,

Whereas AdvantAge Ontario, the association of not-for-profit long-term care, housing, and services for seniors, testified before the Long-Term Care COVID-19 Commission on Tuesday, September 29th, and indicated that 74 percent of deaths reported in the sector were from for-profit homes, 21 percent from not-for-profit homes, and 5 percent from municipal homes; however, the not-for-profit and municipal homes represent 46.3 percent of all homes in the province; and,

Whereas, Premier Ford has made the request at a first ministers meeting with Prime Minister Trudeau to call on the federal government to increase its funding share from 22 percent to 35 percent through the Canada Health Transfer.

WHEREAS, according to TRCA's Board of Directors and Executive Committee Terms of Reference, no meetings are held during the months of July, August, and December;

AND WHEREAS approval of all major developments and infrastructure permits within the TRCA's regulatory jurisdiction for July, August and December 2020 was previously delegated to the Director, Development and Engineering Services and the approval of all time sensitive procurements and agreements was delegated to the Chief Executive Officer (Res.#A184/19);

THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED THAT the 2021-2022 Meeting Schedule, as outlined in Attachment 1, be approved;

THAT the approval of all major development and infrastructure permits within TRCA's regulatory jurisdiction for the months of December 2020 and July, August and December 2021 be delegated to the Director, Development and Engineering Services or their designate;

THAT the approval of all time sensitive procurements and agreements for the months of December 2020 and July, August and December 2021 be delegated to the Chief Executive Officer or their designate;

THAT TRCA staff provide a report to the Executive Committee at the January and September 2021 and January 2022 meetings to summarize permits that were approved under this delegation of authority;

THAT TRCA staff provide an information report to the Board of Directors at the January and September 2021 and January 2022 meetings to summarize procurements that were signed under this delegation of authority;

THAT TRCA staff be directed to bring a revised meeting schedule to the future meeting of the Board should potential conflicts which threaten Board of Directors or Executive Committee quorum be identified in the future, following the final approval of the Federation of Canadian Municipalities 2021 schedule;

AND FURTHER THAT the schedule be distributed to TRCA's watershed municipalities and the Minister of the Environment, Conservation and Parks.

BACKGROUND AND RATIONALE

Given that the majority of Board Members also sit on municipal councils, boards or/and committees, which usually meet on days other than Friday, the recommended schedule accommodates TRCA Board meetings on Fridays. Staff has made every effort to avoid conflicts with the Federation of Canadian Municipalities' (FCM) Annual Conference, scheduled to be held either on June 3-6 or June 10-13 and Board of Directors meetings scheduled to take place March 9-12 and September 14-17. November 2021 FCM meeting has not been scheduled at

the time of writing this report. Statutory holidays and school March break were also considered in selecting the proposed meeting days, while still aiming to maintain a schedule which meets TRCA's functional needs. Further, an effort was made to avoid scheduling meetings on a Friday, following meetings of the Regional Council and City of Toronto Council meetings.

In accordance with TRCA's Board of Directors and Executive Committee Terms of Reference and in line with the practice in many municipalities of a summer Council hiatus to better accommodate planned summer vacations and the December holiday season, no Board of Directors and Executive Committee meetings are being scheduled for the months of July, August and December. Historically meetings during these months were associated with quorum concerns and less voluminous agendas.

At Authority Meeting #2/16, held on April 1, 2016, Resolution #A28/16 was approved in part as follows:

WHEREAS Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) administers Ontario Regulation 166/06, as amended, "Development, Interference with Wetlands and Alterations to Shorelines and Watercourses Regulation" under Section 28(1) of the Conservation Authorities Act:

AND WHEREAS the Conservation Authorities Act and Ontario Regulation 166/06, as amended, enables TRCA to approve permits with or without conditions; [...]

THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED THAT the Standard Permit Conditions as outlined in this staff report be endorsed and applied to all future permits approved by TRCA pursuant to Ontario Regulation 166/06, as amended; [...]

THAT staff be directed to prepare additional Application-Specific Permit Conditions to be considered on individual permit applications before the Executive Committee, as may be required from time to time at the discretion of staff, in consultation with TRCA's legal counsel, depending on the unique circumstances of the individual application;

Given that the busy summer construction season results in a high volume of permit approval requests and there is a small possibility of permits required in December, staff request an exception to Resolution #A28/16 to allow for the approval of all "major" development and infrastructure permits within the TRCA's regulatory jurisdiction for the months of December 2020 and July, August and December 2021 to be delegated to the Director, Development and Engineering Services or their delegate. Staff will continue to work with proponents of "major" permit applications to ensure their timely approval upon satisfaction that the applications meet the five tests of O. Reg. 166/06. Staff propose to provide a report to the Executive Committee at the January 2021, September 2021 and January 2022 meetings to summarize permits that were approved under this delegation of authority. Furthermore, TRCA staff will circulate any permits subject to this delegation of authority to the Board Members representing the area subject to the permit at least a week ahead of the approval date, which will enable Board Members to voice any concerns that may have in relation to the proposed permit.

Similarly, it is recommended that the approval of all time sensitive procurements and agreements for the months of December 2020 and July, August and December 2021 be delegated to the Chief Executive Officer or their designate. Where it is expected that the contract may be awarded during the above-mentioned months, staff propose to provide information reports to the November 2020, June 2021 and November 2021 Board of Directors

meetings, summarizing all information available at that time and recommending the course of action. Furthermore, staff will report to the Board of Directors at the January 2021, September 2021 and January 2022 meetings to summarize procurements and agreements that were approved under this delegation of authority.

Should another item require Board of Directors approval in the above-mentioned months, subsection C.2(4) of the Board of Directors Administrative By-law permits the Chair to call special meetings if necessary, as follows:

C.2(4) The Chair may, at their pleasure or at the request of a Board Member, call a special meeting of the Board of Directors on seven days' notice, in writing, or as is necessary. The Chair shall not refuse the calling of a special meeting with majority support. The notice shall state the business of the special meeting and only that business shall be considered at that special meeting. The agenda for special meetings of the Board of Directors shall be prepared as the Chair may direct.

At Authority Annual Meeting #1/02, held on January 25, 2002, Resolution #A6/02 was approved in part as follows:

THAT the dates of future Annual Meetings be changed to accommodate the budget meeting schedule for our member municipalities, such that the Annual Meeting held following a municipal election be in January while the Annual Meetings in the interim two years between elections be moved to February;

In accordance with Resolution #A6/02, the 2021 annual Board of Directors meeting is proposed to be held on Friday, February 26, 2021.

Due to the current outbreak of novel coronavirus (COVID-19), because no TRCA facility can accommodate meetings while ensuring proper social distancing measures, it is currently expected that meetings will be held virtually pursuant to section C.12 of the TRCA's Board of Directors Administrative By-Law. If the outbreak is resolved or TRCA is able to identify a safe method of conducting in-person meetings, while following all health unit recommendations, meetings will resume at TRCA's Head Office at 101 Exchange Avenue. All meetings will be held at 9:30 a.m.

Board Members are requested to enter all board meetings in their calendars upon receipt of the annual schedule. Board Members are further requested to schedule to be in attendance at all meetings, from the start of the meeting until at least 1:30 p.m. to ensure quorum is maintained and continuity of TRCA operations is preserved.


