



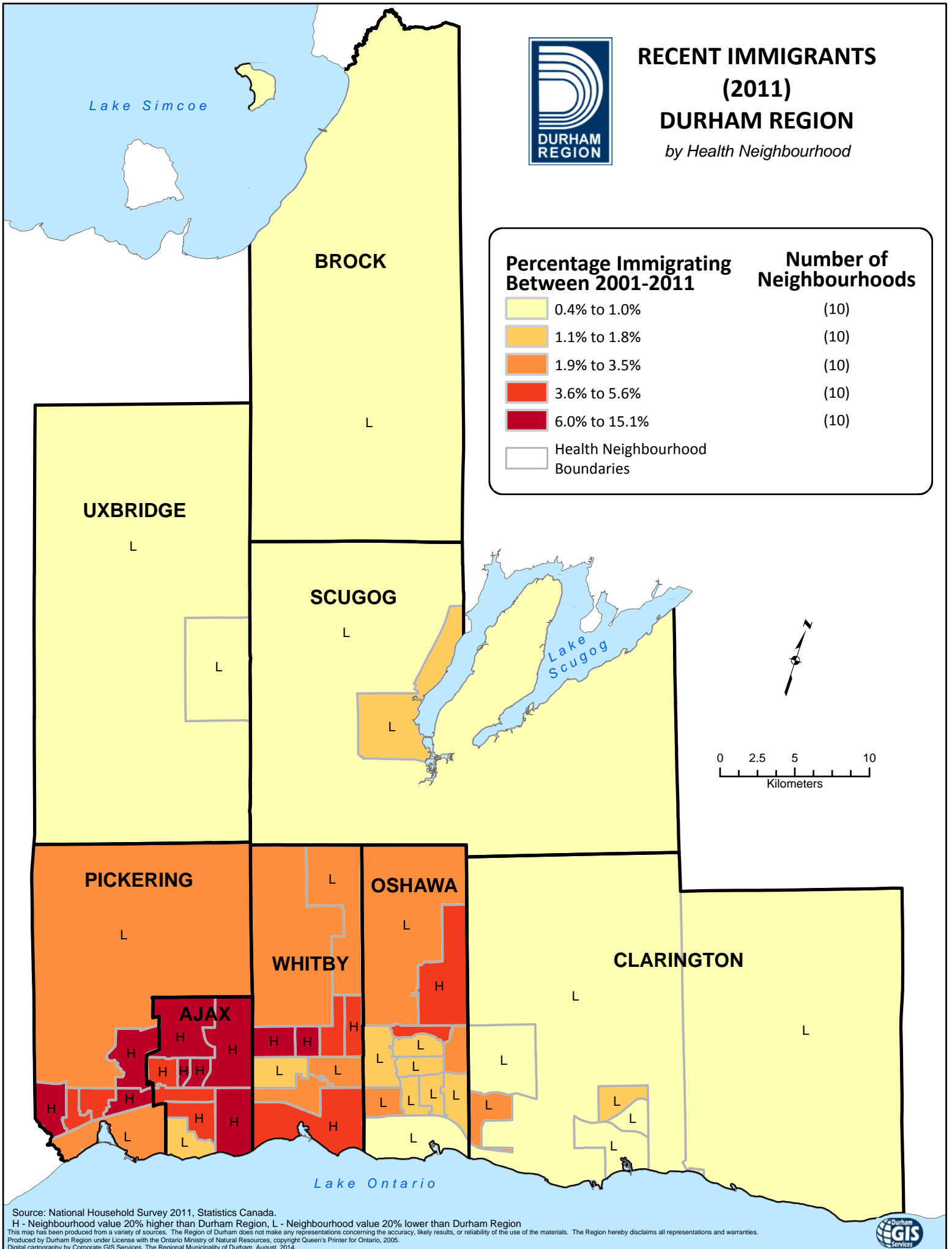

### What You Need to Know

- The percentage of recent immigrants ranges by Health Neighbourhood from 0.4% to 15.1%.
- The impact that being a recent immigrant can have on health is complex and not necessarily negative or positive. Past studies have found that immigrants to Canada showed superior health to those born in Canada but more recent data show that the health of non-European immigrants deteriorates over time compared to Canadian-born residents and European immigrants. Neighbourhoods with high percentages of recent immigrants are concentrated in south west Durham Region in Ajax, Pickering, and Whitby, as well as in northeast Oshawa. Rural areas in the north and in Clarington have small populations of recent immigrants.

### Indicator Notes

- This indicator measures the percentage of the population that immigrated to Canada between 2001 and 2011.
- Source: National Household Survey (NHS) 2011, Statistics Canada.
- The NHS replaced the long-form Census in 2011. As a voluntary survey, the NHS has more non-response bias than a census so there is a risk that the results are not representative of the actual population, especially in smaller areas or population groups.
- Statistics Canada uses the global non-response rate (GNR) to assess the quality of the NHS estimates for various geographies. NHS estimates for any area with a GNR greater than or equal to 50% have a high level of error and should not be released.
- The GNR ranges by Health Neighbourhood from 19.3% to 46.9%. In general, rural areas tend to have a higher GNR.
- Neighbourhoods were sorted into five groupings (quintiles) based on the percentage of recent immigrants. Approximately 10 Neighbourhoods are in each quintile.
- Lower refers to at least 20% lower than Durham Region. Higher refers to at least 20% higher.
