Diversity, Equity and Inclusion initiatives in the Child Care and Early Years Division

February is Black History Month

Each February, Canadians celebrate Black History Month. This is a time to honour the achievements, stories and contributions of Black Canadians, past and present. For early childhood educators, it's an opportunity to highlight diversity, belonging and representation in meaningful ways. By sharing stories that celebrate Black joy, resilience and creativity, we help children see that Black history is an essential part of Canada's story; not just in February, but every day of the year.

Ideas for celebrating Black History Month in your programs

- Explore music, colours and food from global Black cultures.
- Go beyond exploring prominent Black figures in history by looking at local Black community leaders.
- Update your book library with books from Black Canadian authors such as Jael Richardson, Itah Sadu or Zetta Elliott.
- Partner with local community organizations, such as the Durham Family and Cultural Centre, to offer enrichment programs in your centre
- Celebrate the diversity and stories of families, showing that Black history is part of everyday life.

Use this month as an opportunity to reflect on inclusion and how to maintain diverse representation in your programs year-round.

Stars, moons and moments of kindness: Learning about Ramadan and Eid

Ramadan is a special month observed by many Muslim families around the world, and is a time of reflection, gratitude and community. During Ramadan, families focus on kindness, helping others and sharing meals after sunset. When the month ends, the joyful celebration of Eid al-Fitr marks a time for togetherness, delicious food and giving gifts.

In early learning settings, this is a wonderful opportunity to explore themes of empathy, giving and celebration in ways that are meaningful for children. Try setting up a cozy "night sky" corner with stars and moons, read picture books featuring Muslim families, invite children to share about celebrations that are special in their own homes or organize a food drive with a local Muslim community partner. Small acts of curiosity and inclusion help every child feel seen and valued.

Ramadan will begin in February 2026, ending in March 2026 with the celebration of Eid al-Fitr. Exact dates are not yet known because the Islamic calendar is a lunar calendar and the start of each month traditionally depends on the sighting of the new crescent moon.

New mental health resource library resource binders

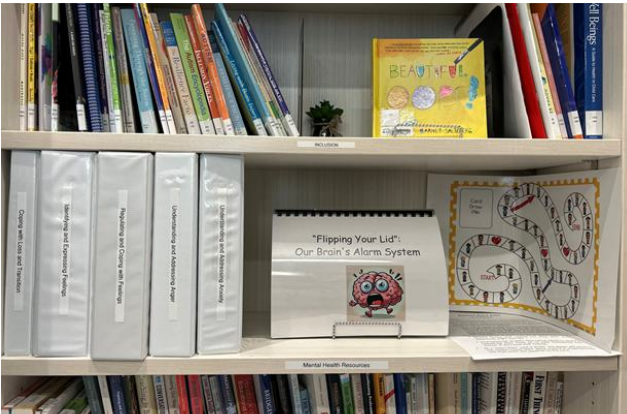

Each binder includes information to enhance educators’ own knowledge and practices, along with practical activities and resources to support children’s social and emotional development.

Topics include:

- Coping with loss and transitions.
- Identifying and expressing feelings.
- Regulating and coping with feelings.
- Understanding and addressing anger.
- Understanding and addressing anxiety.

These binders are available for educators to explore in the Resource Library. If educators find something they would like to use in their program, our team can provide copies of articles, resources or activities to take away with them. Supporting children's gender identities and expression



Gender Creative Kids Canada created a tool to help trans children and youth, and their families by making our society a safer and more inclusive place.

Not only is Sam an educational tool, it is also a symbol of pride, acceptance and understanding. Sam gives the opportunity to contribute in the fight against transphobia by educating children and youth on questions around identity, gender expression and how important it is to be compassionate and to respect trans, non-binary and gender diverse people.

For many people, the gender they are assigned at birth with aligns with who they are. But for some, their sex and gender identity are not aligned. These children are sometimes called gender independent. Other terms are non-binary, gender diverse, gender non-conforming, gender-expansive, trans, and for some Indigenous children, Two-Spirit. Supporting children's gender identities and expressions can look like:

- Thanking children for their honesty in sharing their feelings with you.
- Listening to every child, as this can help you identify what challenges they are experiencing and determine how you can best support them.
- Allow space for gender expression and give children permission to be themselves.
- Respect the children's preferences regarding pronouns and names.
- Offer to connect children and families to safe spaces and helpful resources in the community.
- Find opportunities to show the children that Two-Spirit, trans, non-binary, gender independent, and gender non-conforming people exist, are valued, and belong to many communities who appreciate them.





Strengthening our bonds - Indigenous early years learning

Hello! Aaniin!

We are Sacha (Training Specialist supporting Indigenous programs) and Chelsea (Early Years Indigenous Cultural Coordinator) and we are thrilled to connect with you this season as we continue to grow and learn together.

Winter as a time of connection

In First Nations, Métis and Inuit ways of knowing, the cycles of the seasons are our teachers. Winter invites us to slow down and listen—to the land, to our hearts and to one another. Even though many plants and animals appear to rest, life continues quietly beneath the snow. This understanding reminds us that we, too, are part of the natural rhythms around us.

This season also offers many opportunities to celebrate love and family. In many Indigenous cultures, love is one of the Seven Grandfather Teachings—a guiding value that teaches us how to live in balance with ourselves, others and the world around us. Through an Indigenous lens, love is more than affection; it is respect, connection and care for all living beings. It is about relationships—with people, the land and all of creation.

The eagle and the teaching of love

In the Seven Grandfather Teachings, love is represented by the Eagle, symbolizing strength, vision and the ability to see the good in all things.

The eagle soars highest, carrying our intentions to the Creator. For educators, this teaching reminds us to guide children in seeing with love—fostering kindness, empathy, gratitude and care for the land, one another and themselves.

In practice, this might look like intentional moments of gratitude, storytelling that highlights compassion, or outdoor experiences that nurture a sense of connection and respect for the natural world.

Invitations for practice

Introduce the Seven Grandfather Teachings in simple, child-friendly language, focusing on how we show love—for ourselves, others and Mother Earth.

Guide children in creating kindness projects, emphasizing love in action, not just in words. Use art, song or movement to express love and belonging within the classroom community. Encourage children to learn the word for love in multiple languages; In Anishinaabemowin, "love" is Zaagidwin.

Leadership Conversations

The Quality Assurance Advisors (QA) have been meeting with individual supervisors for a leadership conversation. This conversation provides an opportunity to reflect on the supervisors leadership roles and responsibilities and how they impact the team, children, families and your community. It also provides time for the supervisor and QA to build on their relationship, hopefully continuing to build trust and mutual respect. Opportunities are sought to identify areas where supervisors can be better supported. Effort is made to support challenges faced by supervisors through professional learning, team building, specific training or resources.

The leadership discussion will embed the four foundations of How Does Learning Happen?, and through reflective conversations, may include the following areas of focus:

- Program successes and milestones.
- Program quality and processes.
- Partnerships and responsive relationships.
- Professional learning and reflection.
- Coaching and mentoring.
- Wellness.

A short survey will be sent out in December to capture your thoughts about leadership conversations.

Please let your QA know when a room is changed or added. Visits are scheduled with an attempt to be the least disruptive to your program. For larger sites, QAs aim to schedule multi-day assessments close together. When notified of changes, plans can be adjusted to complete assessments in a smooth continuous flow. Your ongoing communication is appreciated.

Updated Durham Region Operating Criteria (DROC) guidelines coming in the winter

We are excited to announce the release of the updated DROC AQI guidelines for winter of 2026. The actual criteria for the DROC AQI is unchanged. This marks an important milestone in our ongoing efforts to advance inclusive practices within early learning environments. By making these changes, we aim to ensure that all children and families, regardless of their backgrounds or identities, have access to welcoming and supportive programs that nurture their development.

It is important to clarify that while the AQI requirements themselves remain unchanged, the language has been updated to reflect a more inclusive lens. This updated language is designed to better support our practice as educators by fostering a more equitable and welcoming approach in the way we engage with children and families. The shift in language is not about altering the core requirements, but rather about ensuring that our practices are more intentional, inclusive and responsive to the diverse needs of the children, families and communities we serve. By embracing this updated language, we are better equipped to create supportive, enriching environments that promote the growth and well-being of all children and families.

We are excited for you to explore these updates with us this winter, and we look forward to supporting you in integrating these inclusive practices into your work.

Consultation visits are once a month, minimum, and can be more frequent and intensive when needed to address a specific need.

Targeted strategies & resources: Through observation and dialogue, your RC offers evidence-informed strategies to help support both individual children and group dynamics. Whether adapting your physical space or rethinking transitions, you'll receive resources that make inclusion feel possible and powerful.

In-the-moment coaching: From modeling effective interactions to offering feedback on strategies in real time, RCs provide hands-on coaching that encourages skill development—for both educators and children.

How does the RC support children's growth?

Developmental screening & monitoring

Notice something and/or feeling unsure? RCs may assist with developmental screenings and observations, helping you monitor progress and decide when additional support may be needed.

Individual support planning

When children require tailored approaches, RCs can guide you through the creation and review of Individual Support Plans—ensuring every child's needs are understood and strategies are in place to support that child to meaningfully participate in the program.

Referrals and community connections

As your first point of contact, your RC will work with you to identify when it's time to involve a Special Needs Resourcing (SNR) partner agency and initiate referrals. They also collaborate with partner agencies across Durham Region to support the program holistically.

How can they support growing your program?

Inclusion scale assessment

RCs can help you complete an Inclusion Scale, giving you a clear picture of where your program shines and where there's room to grow.

Professional learning opportunities

Workshops and training designed specifically around your program's needs give educators space to learn and grow their inclusive practice.

Collaborative action planning

Together, you and your RC will develop an actionable, evolving plan to support your program's long-term goals—and celebrate progress along the way.

Supporting families too

RCs help bridge families with the resources they need. Whether it's service linkage or community referrals, their support extends to the families you serve.

Early Childhood Education and Leadership Grant Programs

Do you qualify for the Ontario Early Childhood Educator Qualification Upgrade Program?



Educators with six months of past or current experience working within a formal early learning program, licensed child care, and unlicensed home child care environment may qualify for financial support for tuition, travel and associated costs to complete an Early Childhood Educator (ECE) diploma (full-time and part-time) at an approved Ontario College for Applied Arts and Technology.

Individuals who identify as Francophone, First Nation, Métis or Inuit are exempt from the required six months work experience if they have a minimum of one day of employment within an eligible agency.

Did you know Ontario offers employed RECE leadership education grants in eligible fields of study?

Currently employed RECEs with at least two years of experience may qualify for leadership education grants to cover part-time tuition costs in an eligible field of study at a recognized Ontario College for Applied Arts and Technology.

Individuals who identify as Francophone, First Nation, Métis or Inuit are exempt from the required two years of experience if currently employed with an eligible agency.

Eligible fields of study include:

- Pedagogical leadership in Early Childhood Education.
- Early Childhood Education administration and management.
- Facilities management.
- Financial management, responsibility and child care governance.
- Human resources, employment standards and labour relations.
