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Welcome to Fall 2021 GROW!

Welcome to the fall 2021 edition of the GROW newsletter. As we enter into fall in Step 3 of the Roadmap to Reopening Ontario, we want to take a moment to celebrate the many positive advancements our province has made in the fight against COVID-19 and acknowledge the continued dedication and perseverance of educators in the Durham early learning community. Although current safety protocols do not allow us to offer face-to-face training opportunities, we are excited to continue to offer 66 virtual professional learning opportunities that include a combination of 17 pre-recorded workshops, six Communities of Practice, two sessions dedicated



to Home Child Care providers, and three sessions delivered in French with additional French pre-recorded sessions scheduled to release in the fall term. An exciting simulation training program, <u>Kognito – At Risk</u> for Early Childhood Educators, will also be offered three times throughout the fall term.

The Government of Canada recently passed legislation marking September 30 as National Day for Truth and Reconciliation. Debbie Ellis, Children's Services Division's Indigenous Training Specialist, will be offering several teaching opportunities this fall. This includes "Every Child Matters" Raising Residential School Awareness on September 28 and 29. Additionally, Seven Grandfather Teachings, and Indigenous Awareness and Introduction to Kits will be offered throughout the fall term.

We are excited to have <u>Dr. Kerry-Ann Escayg</u>, Assistant Professor of Early Childhood Education at the University of Nebraska, published anti-racist activist, researcher, and scholar present *Anti-Racist Play-Based Learning* on October 18 at 7 p.m.

Shelley Secrett, RECE, will present *Untold Stories: 2SLGBTQAI+ History in Canada* on October 6 at 7 p.m. The College of Early Childhood Educators will offer three presentations this term: *Professionalism and Leadership in a Regulated Profession, Le professionnalisme et le leadership au sein d'une profession réglementée* and *Understanding the Continuous Professional Learning Portfolio*. The Centre Ontarien de Prévention des Agressions (COPA) will present *"Changer son monde"* on October 4 at 7 p.m.



The Early Learning Resource Library will continue to offer curbside drop-off and pick-up every Wednesday for appointments between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. A minimum of one business day's notice is required. Durham Region Health Department guidelines continue to be followed while offering all supports and services.











Durham Region Early Learning Anti-Black Racism Initiative

The time has come when everyone in the practice of early learning must engage proactively on the journey to create and sustain program spaces where Black people, and especially Black children and families in our programs, feel safe, heard, and valued. Belonging is one of the four foundations of How Does Learning Happen? Ontario's Pedagogy for the Early Years, which states, "Early childhood programs cultivate authentic, caring relationships and connections to create a sense of belonging among and between children, adults, and the world around them" (HDLH, pg. 13). But we know there are systemic and informal barriers preventing this from being the experience of Black children and potentially children of other racialized groups, as well. Black children, families, and educators deserve to feel a sense of belonging when they are in early learning settings.

It must be acknowledged that it is difficult and uncomfortable to engage in a conversation when the subject matter is controversial. However, this discomfort should not stop us from learning and engaging. The Children's Services Division continues to support the community by addressing Anti-Black Racism through presentations, workshops, and Communities of Practice.



The intent is to build our capacity to engage in difficult conversations to ensure Durham Region's early learning community can address unfamiliar topics, dispel myths or misunderstanding, and create comfort and ease of interactions in our daily lives.

This fall, we are excited to offer a presentation by Dr. Kerry-Ann Escayg. She is an Assistant Professor of Early Childhood Education at the University of Nebraska and has extensive knowledge of applying a dual lens to the field of early childhood education, with the primary intent of bringing about institutional change for Black children and their families.

Many scholars have reported on the developmental benefits of play-based learning, although there remains a dearth of professional literature on anti-racism in relation to play-based pedagogies. Drawing on the presenter's recent publication *The "Race" in "R.E.C.E.": Reconceptualizing Play-Based Learning Through an Anti-racist Lens*, we will examine the key features and theoretical perspectives of an anti-racist approach to play-based learning. We will also explore anti-racist learning centres and practical strategies germane to creating early years environments that support anti-racist interactions, perceptions, and positive racial identity development among racialized children.

Dr. Escayg's research interests include anti-racism in early childhood, children and race, racial socialization, and qualitative research with young children. Dr. Escayg has published widely on anti-racism, children's racial awareness, and attitudes.

Communities of Practice

Two Communities of Practice sessions will be offered this fall. These sessions will be facilitated by Millie Forbes, Quality Assurance Advisor, and members of the early learning community. Join us as we continue to support building allyship and confronting biases surrounding the topic of anti-Black racism.



Strengthening our Bonds - Indigenous **Early Years Learning**



Durham Region includes an exceptionally diverse network of Indigenous Nations and cultures with traditional territories, including Anishinaabeg, Haudenosaunee, and Métis Nations. Urban Indigenous families also reside in Durham including Inuit, Mi'kmaq, and Cree. The Indigenous population is estimated to be approximately 13.000 as of 2017.

Following the recent discoveries of unmarked burial grounds, Canadians are awakening to the truth of our Residential School system and the tragedies and traumas Indigenous people have faced. The Children's Services Division is committed to being an ally on this journey and offering education and support for early years staff, community partners, and Indigenous relations.

What is the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC)?

The TRC was formed as part of the Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement. The TRC gathered the stories and experiences from more than 6,500 Residential School survivors to educate Canadians on the tragic history of the Residential School system and share the voices of survivors. This informed the TRC Final Report and the creation of the 94 Calls to Action to guide reconciliation between Canadians and Indigenous peoples. The Seven Grandfather Teachings is a traditional Anishinaabe teaching handed down through generations by Elders. These teachings are still valuable today, as it is an impactful way of teaching responsibility to ourselves, to others, and the world around us. It is labeled as "how to live a good life."

Each of the Seven Grandfathers guiding principles are embodied by a sacred animal to remind us to connect with Mother Earth throughout our lives: Love (Eagle), Respect (Buffalo), Wisdom (Beaver), Bravery (Bear), Honesty (Sabe), Humility (Wolf), and Truth (Turtle).

Debbie Ellis will lead us through this teaching of the Seven Grandfathers. We will walk the path of living a good life, guided by these animals and their virtues, and we will learn the spiritual connectedness of the teachings and how we use these virtues to enrich our daily lives with respect and genuine connection to all our relations.



Respect in the Early Learning Workplace

Respect is a necessary component to establishing and maintaining a positive work environment and can have a direct impact on an individual's mental health. Now more than ever, in the current climate of change and uncertainty, it is important that educators feel safe, comfortable, respected, and understood in the workplace and beyond.

In this new self-guided workshop Respect in the Early Learning Workplace, learners will learn about respect and how to support it in the work environment. The workshop will support individuals to examine their own emotional intelligence (EI) to gain a better understanding of what makes them comfortable, look at how they show emotions, and explore strategies to improve their El. The workshop will examine characteristics of a psychologically safe workplace environment and how this can be cultivated to ensure trust, respect, and understanding of one another. Additionally, the workshop will help learners to recognize conflict, develop effective strategies to address and resolve differences, and acquire the skills to build stronger relationships. Throughout the workshop, there will be the opportunity to explore targeted case scenarios that will encourage learners to practice using the skills and strategies discussed and engage in reflective practice to problem-solve common workplace challenges.



QA corner

Supporting outdoor learning experiences through the lens of the Durham Region Operating Criteria Playground Assessment

Creating outdoor learning environments are essential to supporting children's connection to their natural world and promoting physical literacy. When children are provided with opportunities to explore, they "build connections, learn and discover, and make contributions to the world around them" (How Does Learning Happen? (HDLH), pg. 19). The Durham Region Operating Criteria (DROC) -Playground Assessment looks at the intent of outdoor learning environments and the importance of physical play for the children's overall well-being. The document encourages educators to reflect and consider how their outdoor spaces include toys and/or learning materials that support children in learning and developing skills through natural exploration and play.

Guidelines for the criteria were created based on the inspiring pedagogy "How Does Learning Happen?". Each indicator states the intent, references the connection to the pedagogy, and offers reflective questions to inspire educators to reflect on their current practices and identify opportunities for growth and development.

While observing children in their play, educators are invited to reflect on the play space and how it meets the developmental needs and interests of children to support their natural curiosity. How are natural elements (plants, grass, trees) included in the play space? It also encourages educators to support and develop positive outcomes when engagement and supervision are balanced to support children's play. An outdoor play space can be viewed as an extension of one's classroom.



Learning materials and equipment should support children's interests. Provide a minimum of three different types of learning materials in addition to sensory opportunities. Consider how to provide sensory experiences when offering care during the pandemic, while still meeting public health protocols and expectations. Some ideas that may support success could include individual water bins, sensory bottles, musical instruments, and textured blocks or balls.

When children engage in physical play, they "gain increasing levels of independence, learn to persevere and practise self-control, and develop a sense of physical, emotional, and intellectual mastery and competence" (HDLH, pg. 29-30). Consider how you can offer provocations and invitations to play using learning materials and active-play equipment. Wheeled toys and a minimum of two different types of active physical play equipment (e.g., hula hoops, balance beams, stumps, bean bag toss, basketball nets/balls, etc.) can be added to enhance experiences.


Additional resources



Resources for Exceptional Children and Youth- Durham Region (RFECY)

Infant and Child Development (ICD) provides a home visiting early intervention service to young children with developmental concerns or special needs. As part of the Special Needs Resourcing team, the Infant and Child Development specialist provides child-specific strategies and recommendations for educators to support the transition of a child with developmental concerns or disabilities from the home environment to the early learning and care setting. ICD specialists support a comprehensive transition process with the educator through observations, consultations, and active coaching as well as connecting with other members of the SNR team to ensure ongoing support. Durham Behaviour Management Services (DBMS), The Regional Municipality of Durham

DBMS provides professional development and behaviour consultation to the early learning community. Through general room consultation, behaviour consultants provide recommendations to educators that are experiencing overall behavioural challenges in their centre. Behaviour consultants also provide child-specific services for children experiencing significant behaviour challenges and/or requiring more intensive skill-building (e.g. toilet training). With parental consent, a consultant will complete a comprehensive assessment with an individualized program and recommendations to help the child care provider address the behavioural concerns.

Surrey Place - Blind-Low Vision Early Intervention Program

The Blind-Low Vision Early Intervention Program provides early intervention and support to children from birth to six years of age with a diagnosed visual impairment. This service provides supports to children and their families in natural settings, including their home and early learning settings. The goal of the service is to mitigate the risks of visual impairment on the child's development. The intervention provided through this program assists families and caregivers in providing opportunities that support the development of all the senses for optimized learning. Referrals for service must be received through the Regional Blind-Low Vision Early Intervention Program.



Professional learning resources



The Ontario Ministry of Education recently released Building on How Does Learning Happen? Pedagogical approaches to reopening licensed child care. This document shares ideas, reflective questions, and lessons learned from emergency child care to help support child care and early years settings. Building on HDLH, it encourages child care and early learning programs to continue meeting quality and curriculum requirements as they work to provide healthy physical, social and emotional spaces for children and their families during the reopening phase.



Pedagogical Inquiry Tool (2015) and new 2019 Extensions

This tool has been developed by a sub-committee of the Best Start Network to support continued pedagogical reflection utilizing: "How does learning happen?" (2014), "Think, Feel, Act" (2013), and "Think, Feel, Act: Empowering Children in the Middle Years" (2018). These activities will support deeper exploration of the four foundations, pedagogical leadership, inclusion, cultural identity, bullying, etc.
