
February is Black History Month. We invite you to join Davaun Francis and Millie Forbes for Open Conversation, Black Experiences. More information on this can be found on our DEI page.

February is Black History Month

During Black History Month, people in Canada celebrate the many achievements and contributions of Black Canadians and their communities who, throughout history, have done so much to make Canada a culturally diverse, compassionate and prosperous country.

In 1978, the Ontario Black History Society (OBHS) was established. Its founders, including Dr. Daniel G. Hill and Wilson O. Brooks, presented a petition to the City of Toronto to have February formally proclaimed as Black History Month. In 1979, the first ever Canadian proclamation was issued by Toronto.


In 1993, the OBHS successfully filed a petition in Ontario to proclaim February as Black History Month. Following that success, Rosemary Sadlier, president of the OBHS, introduced the idea of having Black History Month recognized across Canada to the Honourable Jean Augustine, the first Black Canadian woman elected to Parliament.

Why pronouns matter

According to National Education Association's (NEA) guide to pronouns, social interactions where a person is addressed by the name and pronouns that are consistent with their gender identity are critical to the health and well-being of transgender and gender-diverse people. Addressing someone by the wrong name or misgendering them by using incorrect pronouns can feel disrespectful. Misgendering can result in marginalization and may communicate that a person's identity is not seen as important.

Not everyone is comfortable sharing their pronouns, including transgender, non-binary or questioning folks who might not be out yet. Others might object to sharing for any number of personal reasons. Respect those who offer to share their pronouns and those who do not.

Pronouns affirm gender identities and create safe spaces by referring to people in the way that feels most accurate to them. Always use the pronouns of the individual once they have told you what pronouns they use. Here is a list of the most common pronouns used (please note: there are other pronouns not listed below):


When correct names and pronouns are used, statistics show that trust and feelings of belonging increase. Pronouns are for everyone; it's how we identify ourselves.









Views about people who identify as 2SLGBTQAI+ are learned at an early age. Engage in collaborative discussions with the children and perhaps start the conversation by naturally embedding books in your program. Find books that reflect the 2SLGBTQAI+ community, as everyone should be able to see themselves reflected in the books they read and feel comfortable about being the person they want to be. Educators are encouraged to talk about the diversity of families, relationships and communities in ways that include 2SLGBTQAI+ people. When readers are shown books that mirror parts of themselves, they get the message that their experiences are worth writing about and are worth being read. They help prepare children for the complexity and diversity of the world.



Durham Region Early Learning Home Child Care Initiative

Getting children ready for outdoor activities during the colder months can be a bit more challenging, but it's incredibly important for their physical and emotional well-being. Here are some tips and benefits to help you prepare children for outdoor adventures, with input from home child care providers in Durham Region.

Ingrid: "With the colder weather approaching. I've developed strategies to support our transition to outdoor play. Getting dressed can be a challenge for some children, with the support of my Early Learning Inclusion (ELI) consultant, I introduced a visual schedule along with some verbal cues. I also use a timer to make it fun, making it into a game as the children like to beat the timer. To minimize wait times and alleviate frustration among the children, I've introduced a buddy system for those who are capable of dressing themselves independently. In this system, they assist their peers with tasks like zipping up coats and putting on hats and mittens."









Carol: "The outdoor environment provides children with freedom to explore, engage their senses and stay physically active. Before going outside, I ensure that everyone is ready and that I've prepared all the necessities in advance, including water bottles, wipes and equipment. The children have access to play on the slide, use balls, create art and play with blocks, making outdoor time fun. We also often enjoy our snack outdoors, using a large tarp as a picnic setting."

Sana: "I have created a visual step-by-step routine that the children are able to follow, which provides structure, increases the children's independence, and communicates the routine and expectation for outdoor time."

Angela: "For some children, loving the outdoors doesn't come naturally, especially in colder months. Our approach as caregivers directly shapes children's experiences by fostering a positive relationship with the outdoors and offering diverse settings, including our backyard, local parks/nature trails, and community walks."



This certificate course is a program by the Mental Health Commission of Canada aimed at improving mental health literacy, and providing the skills and knowledge to help people better manage potential or developing mental health problems in themselves, a family member, a friend or a colleague. This certificate course does not train you to be a counsellor. Mental Health First Aid gives you the knowledge and the skills to assist someone in a crisis/emergency. You will learn how to tell the difference between a mental health problem versus a disorder, early signs of mental health decline, how to respond to someone effectively, and encourage them to pursue getting help.





QA Corner

The Children's Services Division is the system manager for early learning and child care in Durham Region. The Children's Services Division is responsible for managing a coordinated and responsive early learning and child care system that supports children and their families in reaching their best potential. Key activities include using validated research to promote and support quality standards of care for children. Research shows that children who have access to high quality early learning programs enjoy positive developmental outcomes throughout their lives. As a validated tool, the Durham Region Operating Criteria - Assessment for Quality Improvement promotes quality through:

- Providing a rubric of criteria that has been shown to enhance the overall quality of child care programs.
- · Being responsive to and inclusive of the diverse needs of families and children.
- Identifying areas of strength while encouraging an objective eye towards ongoing reflective practice towards quality.
- Long-term planning for growth and quality improvement.

In 2023, QAs began to go back into programs and assess quality using the DROC. Instead of printing certificates and asking programs to post the results of the AQI assessments, programs were asked to reflect on the intent and the outcomes of the assessment to determine where improvements could be made. Programs created their own workplans and, where needed, Training Specialist support was made available to engage with the educators. During this process, we saw programs start over and build new teams, we heard excitement and commitment from educators, and we saw amazing things happen!

In 2024, QAs will return to complete an AQI for every room and certificates will be recreated. Certificates should be posted so families can see the results and conversations can happen to address how your room/program provides quality care. This is your opportunity to talk about the great things you do. It provides an opportunity to share details of your program ,your environment, and the interactions that you do so well. In the event of not meeting expectations, it can be explained how this assessment is a moment in time. There are things that happen: days where we may not have our regular team and days when the unexpected happens. The certificate can be used as an opportunity to discuss how improvments have since been made.

We believe your educator team is competent and capable. We also believe your educator team is professional so that when we do enter your space, we are all being respectful and supportive to each other. Ultimately, we strive to build a trusting relationship in order to support your professional growth and development. QAs are available to answer questions and support the journey, just ask us how! There are Lunch and Learns, Q and As, and staff meetings where we can support your understanding. We acknowledge and respect the work you do every day to show your resilience, flexibility, professionalism, and deep commitment to children and families.
