Report:

1. Purpose

1.1 On February 14, 2023, Michael Smith Planning Consultant Development Coordinators Ltd. on behalf of Gowanlea Ltd. submitted an application to amend the Regional Official Plan (ROP) to permit the severance of a dwelling rendered surplus as a result of the consolidation on non-abutting farm parcels in the Township of Brock. Report #2023-P-** Page 2 of 5

1.2 "A Notice of a Complete Application and Public meeting" regarding the application has been advertised in the appropriate newspaper. Notice of this meeting has also been mailed to those who own land within 120 metres of the subject site. This report was made available to the public prior to the meeting.

2. Background

- 2.1 The subject site is located on the north side of Brock Concession Road 7, west of Ridge Road and east of Sideroad 18A. The property is municipally known as 1705 Concession Road 7 and is located at Part of Lots 17 & 18, Concession 7 in the Township of Brock (refer to Attachment #1).
- 2.2 The subject site is a square shape and is approximately 39.4 hectares (97.3 acres) in size. The southern portion of the site contains an existing house, accessory buildings and a livestock barn. The existing accessory building and livestock barn are to be removed. A woodland is located in the northeast corner of the site.
- 2.3 In 2022, Gowanlea Ltd. purchased the subject site, and the lands are used for crop rotation. Gowanlea Ltd. is a private farm business and owns 22 agricultural properties totalling 833 hectares (2,058 acres) in the Township of Brock (refer to Attachment #2). The workable area of the site is approximately 25.2 hectares (62.2 acres). The house located on the subject site is not utilized by farm employees and is surplus to the farm operation.
- 2.4 The applicant has also filed a Zoning By-law Amendment Application with the Township of Brock to rezone the proposed retained farm parcel to prohibit further severances and residential development.
- 2.5 The surrounding land uses to the subject site includes:
 - a. North agricultural land, woodlot, and rural residences
 - b. East Sideroad 18A, agricultural land, rural residences, woodlot
 - c. South Concession Road 7, rural residences, agricultural land, woodlot
 - d. West Wetland, agricultural areas, and rural residences

3. Reports Submitted in support of the Application

3.1 A Planning Justification Report/Agricultural Assessment prepared by Michael Smith Planning Consultants Development Coordinators Ltd. dated January 2023, has been submitted in support of the application. The report concludes that the proposed amendment meets the objectives and requirements of the Provincial Policy Statement, the Greenbelt Plan, the Regional Official Plan, the Lake Simcoe

Protection Plan (LSPP) and the Provincial Minimum Distance of Separation (MDS) requirements.

3.2 An Environmental Site-Screening Questionnaire dated January 11, 2023, completed by Cambium Inc., reported the subject land as having low level of environmental concerns and no further assessment is required.

4. Policy Context

Provincial Policy Statement (PPS) and Greenbelt Plan

4.1 The subject site is located within the Protected Countryside designation of the Greenbelt Plan. Both the Provincial Policy Statement and Greenbelt Plan permit the severance of a residence surplus to a farming operation as a result of farm consolidation, provided the planning authority ensures that a residential dwelling is not permitted on the proposed retained farm lot created by the severance and will be limited to the minimum size needed to accommodate the use.

Durham Regional Official Plan

- 4.2 The subject site is designated "Prime Agricultural Areas" in the ROP. The site is also located within the Provincial Agricultural System. The northeast portion of the property contains Key Natural Heritage and/or Hydrological Features. Severance applications for agricultural uses may be considered in accordance with the relevant policies of Sub-Section 9A of the ROP.
- 4.3 Policy 9A.2.10 of the ROP permits the severance of a farm dwelling rendered surplus as a result of a farmer acquiring a non-abutting farm, provided that:
 - a. The dwelling is not needed for a farm employee;
 - b. The farm parcel is of a size which is viable for farming operations;
 - c. Within the Protected Countryside of the Greenbelt Plan Area, the dwelling was in existence as of December 16, 2004; and
 - d. The farm parcel is zoned to prohibit any further severances and the establishment of any residential dwelling.

5. Proposed Official Plan Amendment

5.1 The proposed amendment to the ROP would facilitate the severance of a 1.5 ha (4 ac.) parcel of land containing the existing dwelling, retaining a 38.2 ha (94.3 ac.) farm parcel. The subject dwelling was in existence prior to December 16, 2004.

6. Consultation

6.1 A copy of the proposed ROP Amendment has been circulated to the Ministry of the Municipal Affairs and Housing; the Township of Brock, the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority, the Regional Health Department; the Regional Works Department; and the Durham Agricultural Advisory Committee.

7. Public Consultation

- 7.1 A "Notice of Complete Application" and "Notice of Public Meeting" regarding this application was advertised in the Brock Citizen, and a notice was posted on the Region's website. Notice of this meeting has also been mailed out to those who own land within 120 metres (400 feet) of the subject site. This report was also made available to the public prior to the meeting.
- 7.2 Anyone who attends or participates in a public meeting may present an oral submission and/or provide a written submission to the Planning and Economic Development Committee on the proposed amendment. Also, any person may make written submission at any time before Regional Council makes a decision.
- 7.3 If a person or a public body does not make an oral submission at a public meeting, or does not make written submission before the proposed official plan amendment is adopted, the person or public body:
 - a. Is not entitled to appeal the decision of the Region of Durham to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT); and
 - b. May not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the OLT, as appropriate, unless in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to add the person or public body as a party.







Oshawa City Council considered the above matter at its meeting of May 12, 2022 and adopted the following recommendation:

- "1. That based on Report CNCL-22-37, dated May 4, 2022, City Council approve the Neighbourhood Traffic Management Guide, appended as Attachment 1 of this Report; and,
- 2. That City Council approve the new 40 km/h area pilot program outlined in the Section 5.6 of this report; and,
- 3. That Traffic By-Law 79-99, as amended, be further amended to implement a 40 km/h maximum rate of speed on Grandview Street North from Coldstream Drive to Conlin Road East; and,
- 4. That a copy of Report CNCL-22-37, dated May 4, 2022, be sent to the resident inquirers; and,
- 5. That a request be sent after the provincial election to the Province of Ontario to amend legislation such that municipalities would be allowed to introduce bylaws modifying the standard speed to speeds other than 50km/h on the entirety of its neighbourhood roads, and that this direction be sent to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario requesting that they scan Ontario municipalities for further support or investigation into the request, and that this request likewise be sent to the Region of Durham and the other local municipalities in our Region."

Re: Support for Bill 5 - Stopping Harassment and Abuse by Local Leaders Act

The following resolution was passed by Ajax Town Council at its meeting held on March 27, 2023:

WHEREAS currently the most severe penalty that can be imposed on an elected official is suspension and loss of pay for 90 days, even in cases of workplace harassment or abuse;

AND WHEREAS there is currently no process to remove an elected official from office, even in cases of confirmed workplace harassment or abuse;

AND WHEREAS a fundamental, underlying principle of broadening diversity, equity and inclusion in politics rests on the assumption that the workplace is safe;

AND WHEREAS Bill 5, the Stopping Harassment and Abuse by Local Leaders Act would require all elected officials to comply with the workplace violence and harassment policies of the municipality they represent, permit a municipality to direct the Integrity Commissioner to apply to the court to vacate a member's seat for failing to comply with the municipality's workplace violence and harassment policies as well as restrict officials whose seat has been vacated from seeking re-election in any resulting by-election;

AND WHEREAS at least 27 municipalities have formally endorsed and communicated public support for Bill 5, including Ottawa, Hamilton, London, Barrie, Orillia, and Richmond Hill;

AND WHEREAS Bill 5 would both hold accountable and protect all municipal officials;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- Ajax Council express its support for Bill 5, Stopping Harassment and Abuse by Local Leaders Act; and
- A copy of this motion be circulated to the Hon. Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario, Patrice Barnes, MPP for Ajax, the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, Regional Council, and Durham Region municipalities.

According to The Government of Canada's *Information for Municipalities - Medical Use* of *Cannabis* there are two approved ways medical cannabis can be grown: *Licensed Producers* and *Personal and Designate Production*

1. Licensed Producers

Licensed producers are individuals or companies licensed by Health Canada to produce and sell cannabis for medical purposes. Licensed producers must meet stringent health and safety security requirements before producing and selling cannabis.

When applying to be a licensed producer under the Access to Cannabis for Medical Purposes Regulations (ACMPR), or when applying to amend a licence, an applicant must notify:

- The municipality
- Local fire officials
- Local law enforcement

Licensed producers must also notify these local authorities, within 30 days, after the issuance of a licence or the renewal, amendment, suspension, reinstatement, or revocation of their licence. These notification requirements are intended to provide local authorities with information about activities with cannabis conducted in their jurisdiction to allow them to take appropriate measures, as applicable.

Licensed producers are expected to obey all relevant federal, provincial and municipal laws and by-laws, including municipal zoning by-laws.

2. Personal and Designated Production

If a person wants to produce a limited amount of cannabis for his/her own medical purposes, he/she needs to register with Health Canada. He/she can also choose to designate another person to produce a limited amount of cannabis for him/her. A person can produce a limited number of marijuana plants under a maximum of two registrations (for one other person and him/herself, or two other people). Marijuana plants may be produced under a maximum of four registrations at one address.

A registered or designated person is permitted to produce marijuana plants indoors and/or outdoors, but not both at the same time. If a person wishes to produce marijuana plants outdoors, the boundary of the land on which the production site is located cannot have any points in common with the boundary of the land on which a school, public playground, day care facility or other public place frequented mainly by persons under 18 years of age.

The number of plants a person can grow is determined by the daily amount recommended by their health care practitioner and a set of formulas in the regulations.

Health Canada also recommends that registered and designated persons be discreet with their production.

Individuals who are registered with Health Canada to produce a limited amount of cannabis for medical purposes are expected to obey all federal, provincial and municipal laws and by-laws.

Community Expressed Concerns

Recently, some concerns regarding the Cannabis Act and local growing practices have been expressed by community members. Some of the topics of concern expressed have included:

- Excessive noise produced by ventilation units
- Serious odour impacts from production
- Health concerns from neighbouring property owners
- Questions regarding zoning requirements for Cannabis operations, particularly in regards to areas zoned residential
- The current lack of a Minimum Distance Separation (MDS) between licensed facilities/designate growers, and homes, public facilities

Impact to the Municipality

Community concerns regarding the Cannabis Act have an impact on the municipality. These impacts include the costs associated with Council and staff time and legal fees. There is also a potential for community disruption pertaining to licenses issued under the Federal Medical Cannabis Registration process.

It is important to note that the municipality's concerns expressed in this report are not against or opposed to cannabis. The County of Huron appreciates the role that both the federal and provincial governments provide in assisting municipalities. However, when new legislation is implemented, it is often at the municipal level that the impacts of change can be observed and notations can be made for areas of improvement. It is vital that municipal governments pay attention and provide information and recommendations to other levels of government so that continual improvements can be made over time.

Advocacy Efforts to Date

On October 5, 2022 a letter was sent to the Cannabis Act Legislative Review Secretariat of Health Canada. The letter offered requested feedback on the Cannabis Act and a recommendation for a Minimum Distance Separation to protect residential areas.

AND WHEREAS the Province of Ontario passed the Safer School Zones Act in 2017 which authorized the use of Automated School Bus Stop Arm Camera Systems to detect incidents where vehicles failed to stop when the school bus was stopped and the stop-arm extended (O. Reg. 424/20);

AND WHEREAS the Association of Municipalities (AMO) working on behalf of all Ontario Municipalities made its submission to the Standing Committee on General Government on May 21, 2019 in support of Administrative Monetary Penalties (AMPs) to be used to collect fine revenue for school bus stop arm infractions and other applications, including Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) technologies deployed in school and community safety zones;

AND WHEREAS police resources can not be spread any thinner to enforce Highway Traffic Act offences throughout municipalities;

AND WHEREAS the administrative and financial costs to establish the required municipal Administrative Penalty program under the Highway Traffic Act, and its regulations, are substantial and maybe out of reach for small or rural municipalities that have insufficient amounts of traffic to generate the required funds to offset the annual operational costs of a municipal Administrative Penalty program;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Council of the Municipality of North Perth urges the Provincial Government to:

- a) Require all school buses to have stop arm cameras installed and paid for by the Province for the start of the 2023-2024 school year; and

B. Ireland and S. Jones responded to questions with regards to the nature of the plot of land; whether the soil has been disturbed; the selection of the subject site; any hurdles regarding the process; types of fruits and vegetables that can be grown at the urban farm; and steps being taken for food security measures.

Discussion ensued with regards to the challenge of providing education to the community about agriculture.

B) Michael Scott, Project Planner, Region of Durham, re: Region of Durham Draft New Regional Official Plan

Michael Scott, Project Planner, Region of Durham, provided a PowerPoint Presentation with regards to Region of Durham Draft New Regional Official Plan.

Highlights of the presentation included:

Scott responded to questions with regards to the definition of bonafide farm in the draft new regional official plan; the process for lower tier municipalities following the regional official plan; whether municipalities can pass by-laws to override the regional official plan; how agriculture, agriculture related enterprise, and on farm diversified uses are incorporated into the regional official plan; and the requirement for agriculture impact assessments.

Discussion ensued with regards to bringing topsoil into Durham Region; the definition of a bonafide farmer within the Regional Official Plan and the impact on young farmers; development charges fees; how Bill 23 is affecting municipal planning; and when and how development charges will be required.

5. Discussion Items

A) Rural and Agricultural Economic Development Update

- S. Jibb provided the following update:
 - Currently working on providing Economic Development comments on the new draft Regional Official Plan.
 - Providing support to Durham Farm Connections for their open house on April 5, 2023 and obtaining permits from the Town of Whitby.
 - The on farm diversified uses toolkit is still in development, working with the consultant with an aim to provide an opportunity for local municipalities to review by mid-late April

B) Agriculture 101 Training

- S. Jibb advised that when the new committee members are appointed, the Agriculture 101 Training discussions will begin regarding the format of the presentations for presentation to the local municipalities.
- Z. Cohoon advised the Agriculture 101 presentation to Regional Council on March 1, 2023 was well received and provided an overview of questions received from Council during the presentation.

Discussion ensued with regards to best way to provide the presentation to the eight local municipalities.

C) 2023 Farm Tour Sub-Committee Report

- D. Risebrough provided the following update:
 - The farm tour is being held on September 21, 2023 at Carncroft Farm and Swain Beef.
 - A subcommittee meeting will take place before the next committee meeting and there will be an on-site meeting at the farms to review the set up.
- M. Scott advised that the "save the dates" for the farm tour were sent to Regional and local Councils and will be sent to Members of Provincial Parliament shortly. He also advised that the tent and bathroom rentals have been confirmed, and he has received the quote for hats.

D) ROPA 2023-001 – Bethesda Ridge Farms, Municipality of Clarington

M. Scott advised that an application to amend the Durham Regional Official Plan, submitted by Clark Consulting Services, on behalf of Bethesda Ridge Farms, to permit the severance of a farm dwelling rendered surplus as a result of the

consolidation of non-abutting farm properties in the Municipality of Clarington, File: OPA 2023-001, was received.

- M. Scott advised that the applicant is requesting to sever the existing farm dwelling which is not required for a farm employee and is surplus to the farm operation. He also advised that a concurrent zoning by-law amendment application has been submitted to the Municipality of Clarington to rezone the retained farm parcel to prohibit any further severances and the development of any new dwellings, and the use of the existing barn for housing livestock.
- M. Scott provided a brief overview of the application and discussion ensued regarding the subject site.

Moved by D. Risebrough, Seconded by H. Schillings
That the Durham Agricultural Advisory Committee has no objections to the severance of land.

E) ROPA 2023-002 – Thornlea Holsteins Ltd., Municipality of Clarington

- M. Scott advised that an application to amend the Durham Official Plan, submitted by Clark Consulting Services, on behalf of Thornlea Holsteins Ltd., to permit the severance of a farm dwelling rendered surplus as a result of the consolidation of non-abutting farm properties in the Municipality of Clarington, File: OPA 2023-002, was received.
- M. Scott advised that Thornlea Holsteins Ltd. owns of total of five agricultural properties in the Municipality of Clarington with present land holdings of 175.5 hectares, of which 149.3 hectares are workable. He also advised that the applicant purchased the subject site in 2022, that the lands are used for the farm's feed crop operation, and the house located on the subject site is not utilized by a farm employee and is surplus to the farm operation.
- M. Scott provided a brief overview of the application and discussion ensued regarding the subject site.

That the Durham Agricultural Advisory Committee has no objections to
the severance of land.

He also advised that comments must be submitted by April 3, 2023.

Report #2023-P-6 of the Commissioner of Planning and Economic Development – Envision Durham – Release of the Draft New Regional Official Plan was provided as Attachment #3 to the Agenda and received.

7. Other Business

A) Avian Influenza in Poultry

H. Schillings raised concerns with regards to the avian influenza effecting poultry in Durham Region. Discussion ensued with regards to the avian influenza and the possibility of a motion from DAAC on this matter.

Clearwater forward her the list of all neonicotinoids so that she could follow-up with the appropriate staff and report back to her directly.
