February is Black History Month

What is Black History Month?

Black History Month takes place each year throughout the month of February. The month is used to celebrate the endeavors and accomplishments of Black people throughout history and to acknowledge the challenges and struggles Black people have had to overcome in all periods of history.



Why is it important to talk to children about Black History Month?

Children of all ages notice physical differences like skin colour or hair colour. Many studies have suggested that infants tend to have a preference towards same-race faces and are biased towards those of different races. It is because of these innate factors that it is so important to start teaching children about race early. Children are never too young to learn about the beauty of humanity and, as educators, it is important that we start to have meaningful conversations about diversity, equity and inclusion. This includes activities and learning in early learning programs to support the acquisition of social behaviours like empathy, tolerance and acceptance, and noticing and celebrating differences.

Using an anti-biased curriculum that incorporates diversity and inclusion through music, toys, play materials and books helps children to see themselves and their families in their learning environment. It is also important to offer meaningful learning experiences that support conversations about differences and acceptance to help shape the children's perspectives and open their eyes to the world around them. Giving children the opportunity to know a world outside of their family core can create meaning and value in helping them build connections with peers and adults who are different from them. Cultural diversity needs to be celebrated!

How to incorporate Black History into your learning environment:

- Talk about the accomplishments of Black people in all areas of life such science, technology, music, entertainment, activism, medicine and more
- Include play areas and set ups that acknowledge Black people and their contributions to society
- Incorporate toys and materials that are created by Black businesses, authors and inventors
- Talk about allyship, what an ally is and how to be an ally to peers who are different from us and have different lived experiences
- Incorporate diverse play materials into your program in meaningful ways throughout the program environment
- Include materials and stories that explore Black experiences in your program. Remove the focus from being a month of recognition, and instead focus on authentically and intentionally including these materials to support learning year-round

Strengthening our bonds - Indigenous early years learning

On the path of reconciliation

As the journey towards reconciliation at the Region of Durham continues, and we strive to fulfill the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's (TRC) calls to action, it is important that we continue to build relationships and engage in ongoing education.

Education on cultural traditional practices becomes increasingly important as we turn our minds to winter solstice and the time of rest and reflection, focusing inwards on our most powerful selves, rejuvenating our spirit, cleansing the mind, and thinking of ways to give back.



Smudging is a traditional practice common to many Indigenous peoples and involves a sacred smoke created from burning medicines or sacred plants. It is also a practice of many other cultures the world over. In Canada, many - but not all - Indigenous peoples smudge and they may have different beliefs, plants and protocols associated with the practice.

The general practice of smudging is traditionally a ceremony for purifying or cleansing the spirit or space of negative thoughts and feelings. Typically, this would be done in a gathering circle and led by an Indigenous person, an Elder, healer or knowledge keeper. This practice is also done for personal use and as needed for healing and cleansing.

The four main elements involved in a smudge

- The container, traditionally a shell such as an abalone shell, sometimes a sacred stone or piece of driftwood representing water
- The four sacred plants cedar, sage, sweetgrass and tobacco (gifts from mother earth) representing earth
- · Lighting the sacred plants representing the element of fire
- The smoke medicine produced from the fire representing the element of air

The process of smudging is to place your medicines or plants in your container and ignite (preferably with a wooden match). The flames are then gently blown or waved out with an eagle feather, the smoke is then wafted over the person being smudged. The person being smudged pulls the smoke to them and, while gently inhaling, wafts the smoke over themselves to cleanse the mind, heart and body. The ashes are then returned to mother earth by disposing of them outside on bare soil. It is believed any negative thoughts and feelings have been absorbed by the ashes.

We call upon those who can impact change within the healthcare system to recognize the value of Aboriginal healing practices and use them in the treatment of aboriginal patients in collaboration with Healers and elders where requested.

You will have a chance to do some personal reflection on how this could be adapted and shared with the children in your Early Years programs.

QA corner

The Regional Municipality of Durham, Social Services Department, Children's Services Division is dedicated to embracing quality in child care and early learning. Durham Region's Operating Criteria (DROC) is designed to provide valuable insight regarding your child care program. Children's Services Division staff work in collaboration with child care operators and educators to ensure the information gathered is utilized to reflect on pedagogy and practice, set program goals and ensure continuous improvement.

It is expected that all programs with a Purchase of Service Agreement meet expectations of the individual room DROC AQI (Assessment for Quality Improvement) assessments. Meeting the requirements indicate programs that reflect quality are being offered. This document is structured to promote self-assessment and learning that support the goal of enhancing pedagogy and practice. This will provide even higher levels of quality care to the children and families in Durham.

The Early Learning Team is designed to support child care operators and community partners to maintain quality programs in Durham. The goal is to establish continuous learning and improvement plans that ensure our system continuously adapts to the individual needs of the children and families we serve.

The Quality and Contract Compliance Advisor (QA) conducts unannounced quality assessment visits on all licensed child care centres with a Purchase of Service Agreement. The QA administers the DROC AQI measures on all program rooms. The QA will ask questions of the program staff when appropriate. The intent is to get clarification in instances where sub-items cannot be confirmed through observations. Throughout the process, the QA will highlight strengths and identify opportunities for improvement. Once the assessment has been completed, the QA will upload it to the portal for it to be shared with all educators.

This is a time for reflecting on strengths that the program is offering and focus on areas of growth, as well as set short and long-term goals. Educators are able to recognize any budget requirements that may be needed to obtain specific goals.

The DROC has been divided into two sections for each age group. They include the actual Assessment for Quality Improvement and the guidelines. Within the guidelines, educators can review the intent of the sub-section, how this section inspires pedagogy and reflective questions to build their own capacity. The guidelines also include examples relevant to the sub-section, which may include suggestions for materials and equipment. When referring to the individual sections, start at the top, left-hand side and move across each column to ensure that quality indicators are met.

There is no bad weather; play is unlimited when you are dressed appropriately. Things to consider within your community that may help you make wonderful memories with the children in care. 



Early Childhood Education and Leadership Grant Programs

Do you qualify for the Ontario Early Childhood Educator Qualification Upgrade Program?



Educators with six months of past or current experience working within a formal early learning program, licensed child care, and unlicensed home child care environment may qualify for **financial support** for tuition, travel and associated costs to complete an Early Childhood Educator (ECE) diploma (full-time and part-time) at an approved Ontario College for Applied Arts and Technology.

Individuals who identify as Francophone, First Nation, Métis or Inuit are exempt from the required six months work experience if they have a minimum of one day of employment within an eligible agency.

Did you know Ontario offers employed Registered Early Childhood Educators (RECE) leadership education grants in eligible fields of study?

Currently employed Registered Early Childhood Educators with at least two years of experience may qualify for leadership education grants to cover part-time tuition costs in an eligible field of study at a recognized Ontario College for Applied Arts and Technology.

Individuals who identify as Francophone, First Nation, Métis or Inuit are exempt from the required two years of experience if currently employed with an eligible agency.

Eligible fields of study include:

- Pedagogical leadership in Early Childhood Education
- Early Childhood Education administration and management
- Facilities management
- Financial management, responsibility and child care governance
- Human resources, employment standards and labour relations
