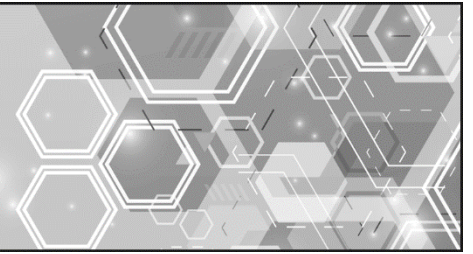

Measles, Mumps, Rubella Vaccine

What is it?

- The Measles, Mumps, and Rubella (MMR) vaccine, called M-M-R® II or Priorix® protects children against measles, mumps, and rubella.
- All three of these diseases are viruses that are spread easily from person to person.

How effective is the MMR vaccine?

- Children who get two doses of MMR vaccines have close to 100% protection against measles; 76% to 95% protection against mumps; 97% protection against rubella.
- People who have had the vaccine may still get one of these diseases. However, the recovery is faster and the symptoms tend to be milder.

Who should get the vaccine?

- Children 12 months of age and older.
- People at risk of being exposed to the disease.
- Children 6 months of age or older who will be travelling outside of Canada to places where the disease is of concern or travelling to areas having outbreaks.
- Some people 6 months of age and older who are exposed to measles may be protected from measles disease if they are given the vaccine within 72 hours of their exposure.
- In Ontario, vaccination against measles, mumps, and rubella is required by law **after the first birthday** for all children who attend school or daycare in Ontario (unless they are confirmed as exempt by the Health Department).

What is the schedule of the vaccine?

- Two doses of measles-containing vaccine are required: once at 12 to 15 months of age and again at 4 to 6 years of age.
- If there is not enough time between the 1st and 2nd dose of this vaccine a repeat dose will be needed.

Are there side effects with the vaccine?

- MMR vaccine is safe and well tolerated. Side effects are usually mild and last a short time.
- The most common side effects are redness, pain and swelling where the needle was given. A rash can happen after getting the vaccine and if this happens talk to your health care provider.
- If you think a serious reaction is developing, **seek medical attention right away**. Any **strange** or **different** changes in your health or your child's health after getting the vaccine should be reported to a health care provider **and** to the Health Department.

Who should NOT get the vaccine?

- Infants less than 6 months of age.
- If you have a severe allergy (anaphylaxis) to any previous vaccine(s) or to any part of the vaccine.
- Pregnant clients.

Don't forget to update your immunization record!

For children in school or childcare, inform Durham Region Health Department of your child's vaccine. Health care providers do not report vaccines to the Health Department automatically. Keep your records updated and in a safe place.
